

A message from the Town Team





Welcome to Ballybay




Ballybay (Béal Átha Beithe; meaning mouth of the ford of the birch)

Positioned in the centre of County Monaghan, Ballybay connects several of the county's main towns, including Monaghan, Castleblayney, Clones and Carrickmacross. Surrounded by rolling hills and scenic lakes such as Lough Major, Ballybay is known for its rich natural beauty and outdoor leisure opportunities. The town has a proud history, with international trade roots, and continues to be a welcoming place for all.

### Role of the plan...

The Ballybay Town Centre First Plan sets out the community's vision for the town's future, supported by key aims and a range of proposed projects.




The Ballybay Town Centre First Plan is a collaborative roadmap that brings together key stakeholders to guide the town's sustainable growth. The actions and proposed investment aims to boost economic activity and encourage public and private sector involvement from both existing and new businesses.

Aimed at everyone with an interest in the future of Ballybay, this plan serves as a non-statutory guide for decision-making, funding, and project delivery.

#### **Town Centre First Policy**

This Ballybay Town Centre First Plan (TCF) has been developed by the Ballybay Town Team, in collaboration with Monaghan County Council, The Paul Hogarth Company, and the people of Ballybay, as an action of the Town Centre First Policy.

The Town Centre First policy is a government initiative that aims to prioritise the regeneration and revitalisation of town centres, focusing on making them more attractive, sustainable, and vibrant places to live, work, and visit. The voice of local people and the Town Team, supported by the local council, is at the heart of this policy to enable community-led development of Irish towns and town centres. The following plan is supported by extensive community engagement and provides a framework for current and future projects and funding opportunities.

### Context

#### Socio-Economic Profile

Ballybay has a population of 1,329 according to the 2022 Census, with 664 males and 665 females, and its population has remained relatively stable over the past twenty years. Its age profile is generally balanced across ages, but it has a smaller proportion that falls within the 20-29 age range. Reflecting its inclusive and welcoming community, the town has a relatively high proportion of residents born outside Ireland, with 376 individuals (approximately 28%) identifying as non-Irish. In line with the national average, around 20% of residents have a disability, highlighting the ongoing need for inclusivity and accessibility in all aspects of development and design.

Economically, Ballybay functions as a market town for its rural hinterland, with key sectors including food processing, engineering/manufacturing, and commerce and trade. The majority of residents rely on cars to travel to work, school, or college, with approximately 70% of journeys made by motorised vehicle, compared to 20% on foot and less than 4% by public transport. Commutes are generally short, with 72% of journeys taking up to 30 minutes and 42% lasting 15 minutes or less, reflecting the town's compact centre.

#### **Digital Blueprint**

A digital town blueprint is being completed for Ballybay. This assessment helps local authorities, community groups and chambers of commerce understand the current digital readiness of their town. The TCF Plan aligns with the findings of this assessment and aims to aid the improvement of Ballybay's current digital position. Generally, key performance indicators in the town are competitive relative to peer towns and regional averages. However, with an overall score of 48.2 out of 100, it also signals much room for improvement.



#### **Sustainability Goals**

In response to the ongoing climate crisis, it is essential that the TCF Plan aligns with the Sustainable Development Goals across its approach, projects, and actions. These goals are aimed at reducing environmental impact and, allied to local and national policy, will support the town in building a more sustainable future.

### **Policy Context**



#### Regional Spatial and Economic Strategy

The Regional Spatial and Economic Strategy for 2022-2032 (RSES) for the Northern and Western Region, including County Monaghan, promotes balanced, sustainable development and recognises the vital role of smaller towns and rural communities like Ballybay. Maintaining the vibrancy of these communities is essential to their future growth, and responses must be tailored to the unique characteristics of each place. It prioritises their revitalisation through targeted investment, placemaking, and improved connectivity. By supporting innovation, compact growth, and quality of life, the strategy aims to maintain the vibrancy of these areas. Main streets are seen as key to regeneration, positioned as attractive, multifunctional spaces that encourage sustainable living, working, and visitation.



#### Project Ireland 2040

Project Ireland 2040 prioritises the wellbeing of people, regardless of location or background. Wellbeing, equality and opportunity represent the core, interdependent themes of the project. The TCF Plan will be developed with these themes in mind, alongside the objective of the project – providing a comprehensive infrastructure for people to flourish, resulting in a better society. The strategic outcomes are based on growth, accessibility, strengthened rural economies and communities, sustainable mobility, a strong economy, connectivity, heritage, natural resources and access to childcare, education and health services.



#### County Development Plan

The Monaghan County Development Plan 2025-2031 (CDP) is a statutory document that sets out important strategic objectives for the county and for its urban and rural development. The Town Centre First Plan needs to be cognisant of the objectives set out in this document to give TCF projects better funding opportunities. The CDP sets out the following context and objectives for Ballybay:

Ballybay, a small to medium rural town with an agricultural focus, serves as a Local Retail Centre supporting local employment. Over the plan period, it will develop a Green Infrastructure Network and an Urban Sustainable Mobility Plan, along with sustainable transport initiatives. Its lakes and rivers, monitored by Monaghan County Council, are to be addressed in a Flood Risk Management Plan to reduce flood risks. The vision is for Ballybay to become a self-sufficient, sustainable, and vibrant community, serving as an economic and service hub for its hinterland. Town centre objectives prioritise sensitive regeneration and improved connectivity. The plan supports retail, employment, research facilities, alternative visitor accommodation, and new businesses, while promoting Ballybay's natural and heritage assets as sustainable tourism attractions, in line with the Ballybay Historic Landscape Characterisation Plan (2006–2010).

### **Policy Context**



#### **Public Realm and Economic Plan**

The Ballybay Public Realm and Economic Plan was commissioned in 2018 by Monaghan County Council to set out objectives for assets, the core (town centre), connections, and opportunities for Ballybay. The report also aimed to establish a viable and growing population, develop infrastructure where necessary to accommodate growth, improve transport links, encourage redevelopment of the backlands and derelict sites, offer sufficient parking within the centre of Ballybay and facilitate the development of Lough Major and the Dromore River system as assets to boost tourism within the town. The town has seen much investment based on the projects identified in the plan, but has also undergone change as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic and other factors. The Town Centre First Plan is complementary of this plan, and discusses similar themes, but also supercedes it based on the town's current needs.

#### **Ballybay Integrated Pathways Network**

Emanating from the Public Realm and Economic Plan was a strategic proposal for an integrated pathways network around the town. Where relevant this has been incorporated into the TCF Plan.

#### **Ongoing Projects**

The TCF Plan recognises and aims to support ongoing public and private developments within Ballybay that aim to make Ballybay an even better place to live. Key projects at the time of writing include:

#### The Library

At present, the Ballybay Market House c. 1775 is being developed to house a new Public Library and Commmunity Space for the town. The building will be extended, and landscaping works will be carried out at the front. This scheme has just been granted planning, and will be progressing as such.

#### **Ballybay Blueway**

The council is also exploring opportunities for the Dromore River Blueway between Ballybay and Lisnalong and are currently developing infrastructural proposals for the Blueway.





#### **Ballybay to Castleblayney Greenway**

The development of a greenway between Castleblayney and Ballybay aims to provide a safe walking and cycling route between the two towns, connecting with other rural communities along the former railway line. In accordance with Project Ireland 2040, the National Cycle Policy Framework and the Monaghan County Development Plans, the Ballybay to Castleblayney Greenway aims to provide a tourism amenity that expands on the growing network of existing greenways in Ireland.

Monaghan County Council is also exploring opportunities for a new carpark, and is continuing efforts to address vacancy across the town, with a focus on the Main Street, including the development of the new Primary Care Centre.

#### **Process**

This plan was shaped through a collaborative process to ensure it captures the community's needs and aspirations.

#### **Public Engagement**

Two public engagement process were used to inform the development of this plan. The first public consultation collected the town's thoughts and ideas over a 3-week consultation period and during an in-person event at the busy Christmas Market.

Responding to the findings, the second consultation presented the draft plan, including the process to date, the vision statement, aims, and draft projects for feedback from the public. The consultation period included a drop-in event in a vacant shop unit in the heart of the town.



### Town Team Workshops

As representatives of the community, the Town Team developed the plan through a series of workshops held throughout the process, facilitated by the Council's Regeneration Officers and the consultant team. The team's diversity helped ensure a wide range of voices were heard.

Key exercises included a SCOT analysis (Strengths, Challenges, Opportunities, Threats), reflecting consultation results, and jointly developing the Town Centre Vision, Objectives, and Draft Projects. This involved a shared exploration of priorities and the qualities that define Ballybay, both now and into the future.




### **Analysis**

A clear and comprehensive understanding of Ballybay forms the foundation of the plan, ensuring that the consultation findings and workshop discussions are grounded in the specific context and characteristics of the town.

To support this, an in-depth analysis of the town's current condition was carried out at the very beginning of the process. This included a review of its regional context, history, physical layout, land uses, accessibility, public spaces, and key infrastructure, as well as identifying assets and threats. This baseline study has informed each stage of the plan's development and helped build an evidence base for the proposals.

#### **Regional Context**

Ballybay is centrally located within County Monaghan, offering strong regional connectivity to nearby towns such as Monaghan, Castleblayney, and Carrickmacross and serving as a local hub within the wider border region. Its proximity to Northern Ireland enhances its potential for cross-border collaboration and tourism. Situated along a river and wetland corridor, Ballybay benefits from significant ecological and recreational value, with opportunities for biodiversity conservation and future green and blue infrastructure. Similarly, the town lies along the route of the former railway line, offering potential for heritage-led regeneration and the development of further regional connections.

### **Local Context**




#### The approach into Ballybay and its town centre is characterised by its natural landscape.

The town is set within low-lying pastoral landscapes and drumlins, nestled among a series of loughs, rivers, and watercourses. Most central are Lough Major and its adjoining park to the east of the town centre, and the wetlands to the west. A well-loved community space, the park and lake have seen many recent improvements, providing valuable amenity space that continues to grow in importance.

### **Historic Development**

Ballybay's urban form grew naturally from its location at a river crossing, where key roads met and those travelling would stop to rest, trade, feed their animals, and repair their carts.

This led to the rise of inns, blacksmiths, and other small trades. The town expanded further in the late 1600s when French Huguenots introduced the linen industry, taking advantage of the local land, water, and natural resources. The community was welcoming of its international linkages, which is still true today, particularly with its historic French and German connections. Mills sprang up, markets were held, and the town became a busy centre of trade with grand houses and local development, including schools, churches, and market buildings, many of which are still landmarks in the town today.

The arrival of the Great Northern Railway in 1854 boosted Ballybay even more, helping industry and transport to grow. In the late 1800s, the town began improving services like water, lighting, and waste collection. However, in more recent times, Ballybay has struggled to attract new investment, with housing focused on the fringe, moving people away from its vibrant centre.

Today, the town centre streetscape still boasts its historic buildings and character, offering a fantastic setting within which its vibrancy can revitalise. The ongoing community spirit offers potential for regeneration, preserving its distinctive character while supporting future development.



Ballybay historic Main Street was a vibrant place for its markets and trade.

Many of its historic landmarks are still recognisable in the town today, including the Market House, built c.1775, which is being redeveloped as a library and important community facility.

#### Assets



#### Ballybay boasts a range of built assets that support its community and local economy.

Key features include a well-defined Main Street with shops, cafes, and community facilities, such as the local library, Men's Shed, and youth space.

The town also benefits from nearby community services, such as Ballybay Community College, several primary schools, churches, and the active GAA club that enhance everyday and social life, making Ballybay a great place for its community.







Ballybay's Main Street faces a significant challenge with vacancy, as the council has identified 72 vacant properties across the town at the time of writing, many of which are located along the Main Street. These empty buildings contribute to a sense of decline that impacts the town centre most, but also present an opportunity for revitalisation and renewed community and commercial activity at the heart of the town. There have already been some successful efforts to bring buildings back into use—most notably the current restoration of the Market House.

### Streetscape

Ballybay's Main Street features wide footpaths and an open layout that supports pedestrian movement and access to local shops and services on either side of the road. Some features of the public realm include upgraded paving, street furniture, and planting, contributing to a more welcoming environment. However, traffic congestion remains a key issue, particularly during rush hour, when the town's central crossroads experience significant delays and limited space for smooth traffic flow.

The buildings and shopfronts on either side of the street frame the view of Main Street. The majority of these buildings are historic and maintain the town's heritage charm. However, maintenance issues, as well as vacancy and dereliction detract from the overall appearance of the streetscape.

Central to the streetscape is the Town Square, situated on the hilltop. The space served as a historic civic space at the heart of the community, and is still recognisable in its layout. The square overlooks the nearby market house and the bus stop is conveniently located directly onto the space, making it a central hub for both residents and visitors.

Main Street ends at its junction with St Patrick's Street and Castleblayney Road, the former site of a historic railway bridge that has since been removed. Several features of this intersection still reflect this history, including its unusual layout, signage, and interpretative elements. The start of Main Street is equally notable, as its southern end crosses a bridge and intersects with the river leading into Lough Major, highlighting the town's close relationship with this natural asset.




The Main Street widens at the square, providing parking, civic space, and a central bus stop.

Traffic congestion and large numbers of parked cars remain an issue and can create safety concerns for all users, in particular vulnerable users like pedestrians and cyclists.

### THE COMMUNITY'S VOICE





#### The consultation highlighted Ballybay's strong sense of community and the warmth of its people.

The existing facilities in Ballybay are well-regarded, though there is a recognised need for more activities—particularly for young people and older residents beyond sports clubs. Similarly, the local shops are valued, but there is a clear desire for greater variety, especially in hospitality. Supporting the town's economy and encouraging business development emerged as key priorities.

#### **SCOT Analysis**

**The SCOT Analysis** is a helpful tool to understand Ballybay, that was developed during one of the Town Team workshops.

Ongoing collaboration, engagement, and communication will continue to be vital to the success of the Town Centre First process. The plan has been shaped by the community's input, and continued local involvement will help maintain the momentum built so far. It will also be essential for bringing the proposed projects to life, identifying new opportunities, and ensuring that future development continues to reflect the shared vision outlined in the following pages. Active participation and open communication will be key to delivering long-term, sustainable change in Ballybay.



#### The Plan

The Aims for Ballybay are:



The projects are organised under the Aims for clarity and to emphasise their integration. However, each project should support the delivery of all Aims and the overall Vision as much as possible.





## THE PLAN

### 1. Projects for People & Community

The following projects focus on everyday life in Ballybay by offering high quality community facilities and infrastructure to support local people and help make our community spirit even stronger.



### a. The Library

Developing a new library and civic space in the old Market House.

The library will provide an important indoor community space, with a number of multi-purpose rooms.

The Ballybay Market House in County Monaghan is set to undergo a refurbishment to transform it into a modern public library and community space. This historic building, located on Main Street, will be conserved and extended to provide a three-storey facility with lift access, ensuring full accessibility. The project aims to revitalise a prominant derelict structure, bringing it back into active use and enhancing local amenities for the community.

The Town Centre First Plan will support the ongoing planning and implementation process, while identifying community opportunities for the use of shared spaces, such as events and workshops. The library should foster partnerships with local schools, organisations, and artists to enhance programming and ensure the space serves a wide range of community needs.

### b. Community Centre & Development

Establishing a community centre in the heart of Ballybay that provides space for gatherings, events, classes and activities, especially for young people.

The community centre will complement the library and be supported through a new community organisation that can take on larger community development opportunities.





A new community centre will provide a welcoming and flexible space for a variety of uses, including events, classes, workshops, and social activities, with a strong focus on supporting young people. The centre will support the library by providing larger and dedicated community spaces for this variety of uses, and other potential new uses in the future. As a result, it will act as a vibrant hub for community life, encouraging connection, learning, and creativity across all age groups. A central location is key to improve accessibility, add vibrancy to the town centre, and create opportunities to collaborate with local stakeholders and businesses.

This project builds on the work currently underway to convert the Men's Shed into a multi-purpose community space. This conversion will provide important community space, create momentum, and demonstrate the value of town centre spaces being repurposed to meet evolving community needs. It serves as a practical foundation and an early step toward establishing the broader community centre.

The centre will be guided by a new community organisation, set up to manage the space and lead future development efforts. This group will help secure funding, coordinate programmes, and take on larger community projects, playing a key role in Ballybay's ongoing social and economic development.

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The development of a successful community centre for Ballybay will begin with the creation of a brief and a schedule of accommodation (i.e. what Ballybay needs the centre to provide). To ensure it is accessible to as many people as possible, it will be important to locate the community centre within the town centre or within a few minutes' walk.

Such a location will encourage more sustainable development of the town into the future, making it easy to walk, wheel, or cycle to this key facility.

The need for community centres is being recognised across Ireland, and as a result, many excellent examples—of various shapes and sizes—have been built in recent years. These recent developments, as well as future ones, can serve as inspiration for Ballybay and help inform the design and function of its own community centre.

The once derelict building in Lusk's Town Centre has been transformed into the 'Lusk Community Cultural Centre', which will host events, and will serve as a space to support the health and well-being of the community.

Located on its Main Street, the new Patrickswell Community Centre was developed on a vacant site in the village centre. Its multipurpose rooms a rotating schedule of community classes, including yoga, karate, dance and various arts. The centre also provides meeting rooms and a small cafe.

Located in the heart of the village and easily accessible to residents, the newly completed Ballinode Community Hall offers a modern, flexible space designed to support a wide range of community activities. With a strong emphasis on inclusivity and local engagement, the hall provides facilities for events, classes, and gatherings, and serves as a valuable resource for community and voluntary groups across the area.

### c. Town Square

Upgrading public realm at the 'hill top' to create a town square that celebrates the centre of the town and that can be used for events on special occasions.

The Square will provide a new community space in the Town Centre after the redevelopment of the Market House.

The square will serve as a vibrant focal point, encouraging local gatherings and strengthening community spirit. Initially, the square will be reimagined through community events and initiatives, such as markets and cultural nights. In time, versatile re-design will allow the Square to continue to function for traffic while also supporting small and occasional markets, cultural, and civic events, fostering a sense of pride and identity for residents while welcoming visitors to the town.



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# d. Town Car Park & Active Travel Hub

Relieving Main Street with a new off-street car park with e-charging, tree planting and cycling facilities.

The project will provide important car infrastructure through a lens of sustainability and modal-shift.

By providing parking off the main street, in close proximity to the centre, the project will help ease congestion, improve pedestrian safety, and enhance the overall streetscape. The inclusion of electric vehicle charging points, secure cycling facilities, and planting supports the transition to greener transport options, supporting modal shift and a more climate-resilient urban environment. Together, these measures will encourage more sustainable travel choices and improve the functionality and appeal of Ballybay's town centre.

### e. Ballybay Enterprise

Establishing new enterprise hubs for flexible working and business incubation space in the town centre, while encouraging industrial growth in the town.

Ballybay Enterprise will provide important economic opportunities for Ballybay through startups and to develop the business case.



The first step in driving economic renewal in Ballybay will be to establish the Ballybay Enterprise Group: a dedicated leadership and coordination body to guide enterprise development in the town. This group will play a central role in shaping the vision, securing partnerships, and overseeing the phased rollout of enterprise initiatives.

Additionally, the project will work to build the Ballybay business case, presenting a compelling rationale for investment, identifying funding streams, and demonstrating the town's potential as a hub for established and new businesses.

The project will also develop enterprise hubs in Ballybay, beginning with the establishment of a central Ballybay Enterprise Hub in the town centre. This town centre hub will create a dynamic environment for entrepreneurs and small businesses to grow-offering access to resources, mentorship, and a collaborative community. It will also contribute to the town's vibrancy by drawing activity the centre throughout the day. There is also potential to repurpose old industrial sites as innovation hubs. These sites can be revitalised to provide affordable, flexible workspaces for emerging businesses. combining Ballybay's industrial heritage with a modern enterprise focus. Collectively, these hubs will support local talent, attract new businesses, stimulate job creation, and contribute to the longterm economic resilience of the town.



# 2. Projects for Town & Nature

The following projects aim to make the most of Ballybay's nature and town setting by improving connections and creating more uses and opportunities for people and wildlife.



# f. Town Park & Lough Major

Further upgrading the park's infrastructure to facilitate greater usage and potential expansion.

This project increases use of the park for the benefit of residents, while growing it as an attractor for visitors to Ballybay.

The upgrades will enhance the park's functionality, making it even more well-connected to the town centre, and enjoyable for a wide range of recreational activities; from boating and fishing to walking and picnicking. The park will become a central gathering place for both locals and tourists, promoting outdoor leisure and encouraging community events. The park provides lots of opportunities for seasonal changes and events. As such, these enhancements will also help to position the town as a destination for nature lovers and outdoor enthusiasts.

The opportunity for an early win in this transformation is the development of a dedicated teen hub and hangout space, offering young people a safe and welcoming environment to gather and socialise. This addition reflects the broader goals of the park improvements—creating inclusive, agefriendly spaces that respond to community needs and support positive social interaction.





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Future improvements may consider expanding the park, including incorporating the church hillside to further diversify the space and its uses, and bring the park even closer to Main Street. The hillside offers scenic views of the lake and surrounding parkland, providing a peaceful natural setting that complements the existing green space.

Enhancing existing and new connections between the park and town centre would encouraging more residents and visitors to enjoy the park as part of their daily routines and allow people to pause and take in Ballybay's natural landscape, making the park a more immersive and accessible outdoor experience.



# g. Wetlands Park

Creating a small new park in the town centre backlands that fronts onto the wetlands, providing educational and wildlife watching opportunities.

The Wetland Park will provide access to the biodiverse and natural asset within a short walk of the Town Centre.

This new green space located in the Town Centre backlands will offer an immersive experience in nature, with pathways, viewing platforms, and interpretive signage to support environmental education and appreciation of local birdlife and other wildlife. It will serve as a peaceful retreat for residents and visitors, encouraging outdoor activity, environmental stewardship, and stronger connections between the town and its natural surroundings.

Its town centre location means that the park also has the potential to become a key feature in Ballybay's eco-tourism offering, promoting sustainable visitor experiences. To make the most of its location and the surrounding development potential, the scheme should be part of an integrated backlands masterplan for Ballybay Town Centre.

# h. Walking, Cycling & Open Spaces

Developing the on-and-off-road network, linking parks and improving street pavements, cycle lanes and stands.

The active travel network will provide safe connections between the town centre and wider Ballybay, with a focus on connections to the Park(s).

This project will enhance mobility and accessibility, making it easier for residents and visitors to move around the town by foot or bike. Focus will be on offroad connections from the town centre to the natural assets. Additionally, by improving connectivity to parks and green spaces, the project will create seamless routes for outdoor activities, fostering a greater connection to Ballybay's natural environment. The enhancements will support increased footfall to local businesses, encourage outdoor recreation, and make Ballybay a more attractive, accessible destination for both residents and tourists.

Other project opportunities look at the overall quality of trails and pavements, dedicated cycle lanes, and convenient bike stands to encourage active travel, reduce reliance on cars, and promote healthier, more sustainable lifestyles.

As part of the network, smaller green spaces in neighbourhoods should be improved for the benefit of local residents.

# i. The Railway Greenway

Transforming the former railway line into a regional greenway while highlighting the town's railway heritage.

The Greenway will provide important regional connections while sharing Ballybay's heritage with visitors and locals.

This transformation will create a scenic, multi-use route for walking, cycling, and leisure activities, linking Ballybay with surrounding areas and boosting regional tourism. It will serve as a welcoming and engaging entrance into Ballybay for visitors directly into the town centre.

The integration of interpretive signage and historical features will celebrate the town's rich past, with a focus on its railway. The greenway offers educational opportunities and enhances the cultural experience in Ballybay. This project will not only promote active travel but also preserve and showcase Ballybay's heritage, making it a unique attraction for visitors and a valuable asset for the local community.

This project should include the restoration of the former Water Tower, creating a landmark venue for a range of community uses and a highlight along the greenway.


# j. Ballybay Blueway

Linking local water bodies and systems to reduce flood risk and create a recreational draw of regional significance.

The Blueway will increase visitors to Ballybay and make the most of the biodiverse and natural wetlands asset.

Focusing on birdwatching and the protection of wildlife, the Blueway will provide a tranquil route for nature enthusiasts to explore the area's rich ecosystem. It will offer designated spots for birdwatching, allowing visitors to observe a variety of protected species in their natural habitat. By enhancing the connectivity of local water systems, the Blueway will help safeguard the wetlands while promoting sustainable tourism, encouraging visitors to appreciate Ballybay's unique wildlife environment.

Simultaneously, the blueway will enhance Ballybay's connectivity to the southwest of the county and provide another unique entrance into the town for visitors. This will include on-water leisure activities that will sensitively be implemented for the local wildlife and habitat.

# 3. Projects for Vibrancy & The Future

The following projects aim to make Ballybay the most vibrant place it can be by taking advantage of large and small opportunities, reviving the buildings, and attracting visitors to the town.



# k. Community Initiatives

Encouraging a diverse range of community events and activities that together will help improve the town.

The community initiatives will help to further grow the community spirit and bring people from across Ballybay together.

These events will offer opportunities for residents to engage in cultural, social, and recreational activities, strengthening connections and fostering a sense of belonging. From local festivals and markets to workshops and sporting events, the variety of programmes will cater to different interests and age groups. Led by local organisations, artists, and businesses, these initiatives will not only enrich the cultural life of the town but also support economic growth and enhance the overall vibrancy of Ballybay. Consideration should be a given to developing an annual event of scale for which the town becomes well known.

- Introduce new initiatives within the community (such as storytelling nights, seasonal events, a farmer's market, and many more)




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Community Initiatives are an opportunity for the community spirit of Ballybay to shine. The initiatives should be ever-evolving, allowing new ideas and groups to be put forward. Using the Vision and Objectives from this Town Centre First Plan can guide new ideas and help envision how they fit into the wider development of the Town.

Below is an example of what a Ballybay Community Initiatives Brainstorm could look like. This is a hypothetical scenario, but many of these initiatives (and others) are possible in Ballybay, with some already underway.





### I. Main Street Revival

Refurbishing vacant buildings, enhancing frontages, and developing backlands via heritage guidelines.

This will introduce good quality space for town centre living and businesses, while retaining Ballybay's unique built heritage.

By revitalising underused spaces, the project will not only improve the appearance of the town centre but also provide much-needed residential and commercial opportunities. Careful attention to heritage guidelines will ensure that the town's character and architectural history are preserved, while allowing for modern uses that meet current needs. This approach will promote sustainable development, attract new residents and businesses, and create a more vibrant, functional town centre that honours Ballybay's past while embracing its future.

This project will require a collaborative and diverse approach across stakeholders and sectors. One approach may include investment in exemplar projects on Main Street that set the design standard and demonstrate best practices in adaptive reuse, high-quality design, and heritage-sensitive development. Continued support of council-efforts and engagement with private stakeholders will also create new opportunities for the Main Street buildings.

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A key strength of this regeneration initiative lies in the diversity of building types that could be developed. From thoughtfully designed residential units that support town centre living, to commercial spaces that encourage local enterprise and larger industrial estates nearby, to community facilities that foster social connection and wellbeing, a balanced mix of uses will ensure the area remains active throughout the day and into the evening. This mix will not only meet a range of local needs but also contribute to a resilient, inclusive town centre that supports long-term growth and community cohesion.







# m. Energy Community

Exploring viable options for renewable energy in Ballybay, including wind, solar, and ground sources.

This will help to futureproof the town, benefiting residents and businesses, while reducing its carbon footprint.

The Ballybay energy community will be a group that collaborates to enhance how energy is used within the town. Part of a national programme, these communities focus on improving energy efficiency, adopting renewable energy sources, developing decentralised energy systems, and identifying funding opportunities for those. Participants can include homeowners, businesses, sports clubs, community centres, and other entities. The initiative aims to deliver environmental, economic, and social benefits by promoting sustainable energy practices and reducing carbon emissions.

### n. Visitor Accommodation

Facilitating the development of overnight visitor accommodation, including short-term opportunities, a campsite / glamping area and in time, a hotel.


The visitor accommodation in and near the Town Centre will provide an important visitor facility for new visitors to Ballybay's many assets.



## Implementation

Through the use of the Action Plan, projects will prioritised and funding sought for their development and delivery.

### Collaboration

This Town Centre First Plan has been developed through a collaborative process.

It is vital that this spirit of collaboration is maintained and strengthened throughout the lifetime of the plan.

Communication around the delivery of the Town Centre First Plan should be regular, clear, and transparent, ensuring that everyone in Ballybay is informed of progress. Consideration should be given to the most effective communication methods to reach a broad audience, including those who may not attend public events.

Every Town Centre First project should be delivered with the same commitment to collaboration and co-design. This means regular public engagement opportunities, along with detailed dialogue with key stakeholders such as landowners and elected representatives.

The Town Team should remain as representative of the town as possible, with flexibility to welcome new members as needed.


# Development & Delivery

Once prioritised and funding is secured, each project will undergo a process of further design and development.

In most cases this will involve the appointment of a design team and all projects will involve further processes of engagement to ensure the local community has their say. Some projects will also require planning consent and other approvals.

The projects in this Town Centre First Plan are all designed to have a regenerative impact on the town. That means they must play their part in attracting complementary investment, be they new residents, new businesses or visitors that bring new spending to Ballybay. To be successful the project must be designed, managed and maintained to an excellent standard, effectively 'raising the bar' across the town as a whole.




#### What three things do you \*like\* most about Ballybay?




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#### What three things do you \*dislike\* most about Ballybay?




